Pinto Horses will be rejected from registration because of Heavy Draft, and Appaloosa Blood in Mares and Stallions, either visible or known.

Height requirements: 14.1 Hands for Stallions and Geldings and 14.1 Hands for Mares.

If more space is required for Description, use bottom of sheet.

### INFORMATION TO INSPECTORS

Please take note that the new Inspector's Report is scored on a point basis. IF you have a perfect horse, he could score 100 points. As there is yet to be a perfect horse, the sheet should be scored accordingly.

You will notice that for the head, neck and pasterns, you could score points on two sections, but not necessarily.

For the withers, shoulder, front, front legs, hind legs, back, birth and barrel, you score one part only. There may be an in-between in girth or the barrel, so in such cases, the inspector would score a (2) instead of a (3) or a (1).

For the width of hips section, there is a possible (5) points. Most people would score this section by standing behind the horse.

A long, deep, sloping hind quarter is more desirable. It has been found that many level crouped horses fall away by the tail and have not width enough at the pin bones.

When scoring the unsoundness, please state the unsoundness, if any. About 2 points should be taken off each unsoundness.

In the action section, there are some new additions. One is Rope Walking or Cupping. Rope Walking is the crossing of one front foot over to the front of the other. Cupping is the picking up of the front feet under the belly and NOT straight behind the spot where it was placed on the ground. This is the fault found frequently in some of the other breeds.

This last section of Conformation, Characteristics and General Appearance is a big section as a horse may score high in points and yet not be quite what is wanted. There is a possible 20 points in this section, but as you know there is yet to be a perfect horse, and it is quite unlikely to have a horse score (20) points in this section.

When the points are added and tabulated, a mare and gelding should score at least 65 points. A stallion (having more influence on the breed) should score at least 75 points.
